

FOUR HUNDRED FANS FOR





A MESSAGE FROM MARK

Welcome back to all those lucky enough to get away over the summer. The weather was a bit of a challenge but hopefully everyone managed to find a bit of sunshine whether home or abroad.

October is a busy month for The Fed with lots of Jewish Festivals, which started with Rosh Hashanah on the last day of September and will end with Simchat Torah on October 22nd. This is a very special time of year for our Jewish residents, families, visitors, service-users, volunteers and colleagues. At Heathlands Village a huge team effort is required to ensure everything goes smoothly.

As most people will now know, we have closed the ground floor short side of our main building, ahead of work starting this month to create another specialised dementia facility - an annexe to Beach House. We are delighted to have fundraised most of the money for this and are confident of reaching our budget target before completion.

In addition, the new communal mortuary facility will also open at the beginning of this month.

Further good news is that our contract to provide 'discharge to assess' - D2A - beds for the NHS has been renewed until March 2020 and the Bury 'integrated care team' will move in to their new offices later in the month. Please help to make the team welcome - working together in partnership with statutory services is a key element of our organisational plan and values.

Our Community Services teams continue to be extremely busy. The Community Advice and Support Team - CAST - has been managing a high volume of referrals and, together with the volunteering@thefed team, will get busier still as the winter months approach. Interestingly, our 2018/19 annual report will highlight a 5% increase in enquiries, and 7% increase in referrals to CAST compared to the previous year.

Over the coming weeks we will welcome three new colleagues from overseas to join our existing amazing nursing team. They will initially live at Heathlands Village before moving to their own accommodation. As we all know, starting a new job can be scary but a new job in a new country must be especially daunting. Please help, support and make Brandina, Fiona and Pankaj feel very welcome.

It was wonderful to see so many visitors here for our Fed Farm Day in September. We reckon that over 400 people came along including at least 100 children. Luckily someone booked the sunshine and it was a fantastic day. I was asked to help out by the Fundraising Team who needed to use my "leadership skills" - I spent a very happy three hours leading donkeys around the Seaside Garden!

This final newsletter of 2019 also marks the 10-year anniversary of the creation of The Fed following the merger with Heathlands Village which took place in December 2009. The last decade has certainly been a rollercoaster and who would have predicted Brexit?

2020 and the next decade may prove equally as challenging but what defines us as an organisation

is our amazing staff, volunteers and donors. Together we make a huge difference to people's lives.

PERMITS

FOR FED FRIEND RICHARD



Having dedicated almost 30 years of his life to The Fed, you could be forgiven for thinking that Richard Hamilton isn't actively looking for new ways to support the organisation.

You couldn't be more wrong however, as Richard - an everpresent figure at Heathlands Village as a member of our Customer Service's Team - saddled up over the summer and completed a 62-mile Manchester to Blackpool bike ride in aid of The Fed's essential services.

"I fancied doing it," says Richard, "because I love cycling - I've got three bikes - and I thought if I could get some people connected with Heathlands to sponsor me, I could get some support for The Fed.

"I was absolutely blown away by the response. So many members of staff donated, with relatives of residents and former residents - who I've known for decades - contacting me to sponsor my ride, and helped me raise just under £2,000."

For Richard, his time spent behind the desk at Heathlands Village is much more than a job. Just ask anyone entering the building when he's on duty, hearing a hearty 'Good morning!' - often before even stepping over the threshold!

"I have such a connection with the people here," he says. "The residents and their families - they're my friends - and they feel the same way.

"I've been invited to Bar Mitzvahs, weddings - you name it. Even people whose relatives have passed away say that seeing me brings back happy memories of their association with us.

"I suppose in that way I'm a celebrity!" he laughs.

Over his time at Heathlands

Village, Richard has also picked up an impressive Yiddish vocabulary - leading to more than a few people mistaking him for a member of the Jewish faith!

"Boruch Hashem, thank G-d, it all began over twenty years ago," he smiles.

"Two residents - Sammy Flamholtz, who we called Shmulik, and Reverend David Kurnoff - used to come down at night and see me. I'd put the kettle on and we'd put the world to rights - and they used to teach me Yiddish! Shmulik was the late husband of Anita - who we look after now.

"They were such wonderful men," he continues. "I'll always remember Reverend Kurnoff going into the kitchens at Pesach time to help with the cooking.

"I took him to a shiva house in Whitefield once - and told him I was happy to do him a mitzvah!"

Over nearly three decades, Richard has built up a connection with generations of the community, all of whom appreciate his cheery welcome and friendly demeanour - always interspersed with a smattering of Yiddish.

As a visitor leaves the premises, they are followed by Richard's booming voice:

"Have a shanah tova, with mazal and nachas! A Happy New Year!"

FELINE FINE AT HEATHLANDS VILLAGE!

Hamburger Unit resident, Sandra Irwin, has a special feline friend to keep her company in Heathlands Village - and it's one which we have been delighted to welcome.

"Blossom is my baby - she's so well behaved but she does sometimes get into mischief!" she says. "I've had her for a while. She finds a space on the bed at night and curls up next to me."

For a pet cat, Blossom is surprisingly tolerant of being passed from person to person - but that's because she is not your average moggy but in fact a state-of-the-art robot pet. Her lifelike breathing, movements and meowing are designed to provide engaging stimulation to people who are living with memory loss or dementia.



The success of the animal has been obvious, according to Shift Leader, Lynda Parton: "Our residents absolutely love the similar cat we keep in our Activity Centre," she said.

"It originally belonged to Sandra, so when it became a permanent feature in the Activity Centre, we made sure to replace the one she had. She adores it - they all do."

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION!

Residents and tenants of Heathlands Village had their fifteen minutes of fame after joining a national campaign, aimed at ensuring vegetarians, vegans and others with dietary-specific requirements have their rights respected should they lose capacity to make decisions about their daily meals.



Vegetarian4Life, a UK charity aimed at improving the quality of life of older vegetarians and vegans, will present their campaign to the Houses of Parliament this month, intending to support those with cognitive or capacity issues who require a specific diet.

Katie Butler, of Vegetarian4Life, said that "Our campaign is based around a formal inquiry which we as a charity are taking to the Houses of Parliament, regarding those with cognitive or capacity issues not being served the foods they want - for example a vegetarian with dementia being served meat.

"As part of that, we also want to share and promote care homes that are already providing great food for their residents - and Heathlands Village is a perfect example of the choice and respect that we want all older people to enjoy."

Moorview House tenant, Gogi Younger, was one of the group who took part in the filming.

"I've been a vegetarian all my life," she said. "The food here is very good - I've no complaints. We have a lot of choice and it's really very nice indeed."

Joining Gogi in the promotional film were residents Thelma

Lapedus, Daphne Levine and Joyce Kaye - who all took to the camera with ease!

"What great fun it was," said Daphne, "and I did my best not to giggle!"

As ever, Lucy Edwards, our Trusts, Foundations and Bids Writer, has been busy generating income for The Fed over the last few months and here are some of her recent successes and highlights:

We have just completed this year's cycle of social accounting. This process has involved talking to a range of our stakeholders about the work we do and the difference we are making to people's lives. The results are generally very positive and we hope to publish the full set of accounts shortly. Thank you to everyone who took part; your help is appreciated.

Halle - A huge thank you to the Halle in Manchester who very kindly sent us two free tickets for a resident following their expressed wish to go to a concert at the Bridgewater Hall. Hopefully we can organise this for her in the next few weeks.

The Shoresh Charitable Trust kindly supported us again with a £5,000 grant towards salary costs to run our Carers' Project.

This supports adults who are responsible for caring for a loved one and are not paid for this.

The Booth Charities have kindly supported us once again with a £3,000 grant towards the running costs of our Purple Room Community Café.

In our social accounts this year, one member of the café project told us that "The community services like the community café really help as I suffer from depression and wanted to have some company every week."



Once again, we were thrilled to be supported by the Childwick Trust who have donated £12,000 towards the running costs of our brilliant volunteering@thefed service.

The Big Lottery Fund - 'Awards for All' has given us a grant of £9,975 towards the costs of running our Purple Room Community Café. Again, this funding will contribute towards the salary costs of our CAST team which is vital to our organisation.



Visiting The Fed's My Voice Manchester Project, based at Heathlands Village, Yoni Berrous was presented with signed copies of the latest set of life storybooks, by their authors or representatives. These nine further books will be added to the eight already archived at Yad Vashem. A further 11 are currently in progress with others planned.

Addressing the storytellers, Yoni spoke of the importance of bringing meaning to the Holocaust.

He explained, "It's about bringing back the story of the Holocaust with humans in the centre."

He wants to see the books, "in every school... in national and local libraries.

"The next generation may not be able to meet the survivors, so we must introduce their stories to people.....and bring it 'back to the core', My Voice is part of the answer."



Storyteller, Gisela Feldman, recounted the touching moment when her grandson told her, "Grandma, you told me your story, but now I have read the book I hear your voice."

Leonard Kaufmann expressed how he felt knowing a copy of his book was going to Yad Vashem: "I feel honoured, I would never have thought of it."

Chairman of The Fed, Bernie Yaffe, spoke of his pride in the project and the relationship built with Yad Vashem.

"I'm delighted that The Fed's small local initiative has assumed such significance for Holocaust education throughout Europe, at the same time as providing essential befriending and fantastic opportunities for volunteers. It really does tick all the boxes."
